A Rich History

The CDF Freedom Schools® program has its origins in the Mississippi Freedom Summer Project of 1964, which brought college students from around the country to Mississippi to secure justice and voting rights for Black citizens. These early Freedom Schools aimed at keeping Black children and youth safe and giving them rich educational experiences including instruction in reading,

writing, humanities, mathematics, and science along with subjects that were not offered in public schools. All instruction was tailored to encourage students to become independent thinkers, problem solvers, and agents of change in their own

solvers, and agents of change in their own communities. Since 1995, the CDF Freedom Schools program has served more than 150,000 children (K-12) and more than 17,000 young adults and child advocates have been trained on the delivery of the CDF Freedom Schools model, which has expanded to 182 program sites nationwide.

2021 Richmond CDF Freedom School Program Components

- Free, six-week summer literacy and cultural enrichment program from 8:30–3:30 daily
- June 15–July 23, 2021, in-person at King Elementary in Richmond, Ca.
- Serving K-6 students, in small groups of ten
- Preference will be given to African American students, Richmond Elementary school students, and those receiving free or reduced lunch
- A research-based, multicultural Integrated Reading Curriculum that supports students and families through five essential components:
 - High-quality academic enrichment
 - Parent and family development
 - Civic engagement and social action
 - Intergenerational servant leadership development
 - Nutrition, health, and mental health
- Students will receive two meals and snack daily
- Students are given a book each week to build their home libraries
- Daily enrichment activities and weekly field trips
- Weekly, virtual parent meetings
- At the program's end, all Freedom Schools scholars across the country unite for a National Day of Social Action.

Program Impact

- Freedom School is proven to curb summer learning loss, enhance children's motivation to read, make them feel good about learning, and increase cultural knowledge and pride.
- Scholars reported through the national assessment, that Freedom Schools helped them:
 - Accurately assess their strengths and limitations, with a well-grounded sense of confidence, optimism, and a "growth mindset".
 - Successfully regulate their emotions, thoughts, and behaviors in different situations.
 - Take the perspective of and empathize with others.
 - Communicate clearly, listen well, cooperate with others, resist inappropriate social pressure, negotiate conflict constructively, and seek and offer help when needed.
 - Make constructive choices about personal behaviors and social interactions.
- Scholars participate in book discussions and social action projects that address fairness, voting rights, and education access.
- The overall program theme is: I Can Make A Difference! The six weekly sub-themes (I Can Make a Difference in My: (1) Self, (2) Family, (3) Community, (4) Country, (5) World, and (6) with Hope, Education, and Action) walk the scholars from examining their current power and worth to seeing themselves as world citizens by the program's end.
